Best Practice

- 1. Title of the Practice: Advanced Learners' seminar
- 2. Goal: The goal of Advanced Learners' Seminar is to encourage the students to study beyond the limits imposed by the syllabus and thus to develop their interest in a specific topic. The syllabi are designed keeping in mind the learning level of the learner. But it often imposes limitations on the learning process. Besides, often contextual matters, backgrounds, stages of development of a particular theory are overlooked in the design of the syllabi which may arouse the interest of the learner. Another goal is to develop the skill of communication among the students.
- 3. The context: One of the challenging issues is to bring the students of the various disciplines together in one platform so that they may come to know about the various ideas in different fields of study and engage in an exchange of ideas.
- 4. The practice: The departmental teachers tell the interested students to prepare papers for presentation. Sometimes the paper is paper is prepared by a group of students and one of the group is asked to present it. The teacher may also suggest topics to the students and help them with the writing of the paper by suggesting reference materials and important developments. If a number of students have prepared papers who cannot be accommodated in the day of the seminar, generally a selection is made by the teachers. On the day of the seminar, students present their papers department wise in front of th Principal, teachers of their department and other teachers and students of various disciplines. There is a question answer session after each paper. This year the advanced learners seminar was held on two days, the 6th and 7th of April, 2018.
- 5. Evidence of success: The students do feel encouraged to study more and go beyond a syllabus oriented learning and feel confident to present their ideas to an assembly of teachers and other students.
- 6. Problems encountered and resources required: One of the issues experienced while organising the advanced learners' seminar is that while we wish to make the seminars an interdisciplinary affair where students of various disciplines participate and listen to each other, often when the speakers of a particular subject is speaking, the students of the other subjects or departments tend to lose interest. Also because the number of hours we can devote to such seminars are limited, all the interested students do not get a chance to speak..

Do you personally approach your teachers about your academic weaknesses, reasons for poor results, and for other reasons? If yes, please mention th reasons. 3. Do you study reference books in the library reading room? If yes, please mention a few reference books you have studied. 4. Do you attend the basic computer course offered by the College regularly? If no, please cite reasons for not attending. 5. Do you attend or participate in the career related and academic seminars, awreness programmes and cultural programmes organized by the college?if yes, please mention the programmes that you have participated in or attended.

This was followed by a meeting with the students department wise by the Principal and the coordinator of the IQAC where we discussed the major issues raised by the students in the feedback. We also discussed if they had any specific academic problems apart from the questions offered in the feedback.

- 5. Evidence of success: The process seemed to be quite successful as the students were candid about their problems; and it seemed to encourage them to talk to the teachers about their problems. Ninety-two students participated in the meeting.
